



The Framing Question: Is there "profit" from man's toil "under the sun"? (1:3)


A **Suggestive Poem:** The physical universe shows both consistency and variation in delightful ways; but it will never reveal all that we would like to know. (1:4-11)

## So then, what is the wise person to do?

"I know that nothing is better for them than to **rejoice**, and to **do good** in their lives, and also that every man should eat and drink and **enjoy** the good of all his labor—it is the **gift of God**." 3:12-13

This is how the whole book fits together:

Frustrated in his exhaustive efforts to understand God's Providential design as it impacts our earthly experience, Qohelet concludes that one must still enjoy life as a gift from God, all the while living it responsibly by trusting in the One to Whom he must ultimately give an account.
